Stress patterns in words: -ious

In this lesson you will:

- Learn another i-vowel suffix that follows the same stress rule you've seen before
- Recognize sound changes that affect both the root and the suffix
- Identify stress patterns in words that have two suffixes built on one another

This lesson focuses on teaching you to apply the knowledge you've gained. The data sets here are less controlled, allowing you to see suffixes behaving in slightly more complex ways than you saw in previous lessons. You will also see that some of the information isolated in previous data sets is not necessary for the task of learning stress patterns. Discarding this less relevant information will make room for new, more useful topics.
